THE GREAT CIRCLE. This may be the best preserved of the geometric earthworks not just in Newark, but anywhere in Ohio. It's a gigantic circular enclosure, 1200 feet from crest to crest. Four football fields would fit across it end to end. The walls vary in height from 4 feet up to 14 at the monumental gateway.
